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


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WORKFORCE RISK PERCEIVED TO BE AT 5 YEAR HIGH AND EXPECTED TO INCREASE IN 2021





More than a fifth also cited 'geopolitical threats' and 'civil unrest' as key causes.





COVID-19 HAS BECOME THE PRISM THROUGH WHICH MOST FUTURE RISKS ARE SEEN













COVID-19 IMPACT SCALES AND UNDERLYING MEDICAL & SECURITY RISKS

Medical risk rating
















